From the Team Rector

It is not every day that a rock musician is asked to right an editorial in a newspaper. So, I was surprised to come across an editorial written by the British rock musician Gary Numan in The Kansas City Star. He now lives in America with his family and is currently on tour in America, playing a concern in Kansas. which is probably why he was asked to contribute to the paper. Some readers will be too old to know who he is and some too young to know who he is, but that doesn't matter only that his piece was thoughtful and sensible, perhaps not what we expect from a musician. He was commenting on living in America under Trump, but a lot of what he wrote is applicable across the developed world. For example

"Awful behaviour and language, the sort of thing we would rightly punish our children for, is now commonplace in every community. It's accepted, forgiven and excused, even in the very highest office in the land. But respect matters. It has to. Insulting people you disagree with rather than pointing out the flaws in their arguments simply proves you have no point of your own to discuss. It's just ugly talk. Ugly talk masquerading as "saying it like it is" is no more honest than any other way of talking. But ugly talk is insidiously contagious. It creates a crudeness that leads to ignorant conversation and, inevitably, to confrontation. It fixes nothing and helps no one."

We don't always expect musicians to have anything sensible to say and we don't expect The Archbishop of Canterbury to be speaking at a Trade Union congress, but Justin Welby gave a speech at last week's congress. The movement was celebrating its 150th Anniversary and his speech was challenging and thoughtful and it seem to me he was talking a lot of sense. For example:

"Oppression of minorities, division, instability and economic injustice march together. A few weeks ago, it was reported that households are now even more indebted than they were in 2008. That is the result of low pay, an economy that allocates rewards through power not for labour. The result is that debt support charities, including one based in Bradford of which I am a patron, Christians Against Poverty, find more and more people crowding to their doors, caught in debt slavery. More than that, when these charities help them – strengthening their families, working with them to negotiate with their lenders – it has been the understanding that the creditors would contribute so that the charity can help people get their life back on track. A third of lenders and debt collectors simply fail to contribute. That is not an economic decision of the market, it is a failure of common human decency, of values. It says no to the common good, solidarity. And God replies, 'but let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream.




