Canon Nigel writes

The other day a got a Notification in my Twitter Account that read:

'Interesting newsletter piece. Just interested in how a world so painful shows God?'

Clearly I was delighted that someone is reading what I write, but obviously I had to make a meaningful response which because of Twitters limit on the number of characters, mean I had to keep it to the point. My response was:

'I suppose a world so painful displays how out of kilter humanity has become if you assume the creation works best in a certain way.'

What I meant by this I can now elaborate upon in the pages of this newsletter.

Currently the country is gripped by a crisis in the NHS with many NHS Trusts not having the capacity to deal with the volume of folk needing to use its services. Some are saying that this always happens in the winter, others are claiming that an injection of additional funds will cure the problem. It seems to me that political ideology gets in the way of finding a solution to the problem. No one is asking the right questions, because they already have the answers prepared because of their own political bias.

Children's metal health is an issue at present. The fact that those in their GCSE years are experiencing a workload such as this, which came to me by Facebook:

It seems to me that once again we have another knee-jerk response to the symptoms of a problem, not a treatment for the underlying disease.

Our country, our world is 'dis-eased', ill at ease, because of the pressures of our modern, digital, 24/7 way of living. This brings about the pain that I alluded to in my Tweet, pain that shows not an absence of God, but the fact that we are living contrary to the way the creator made us.
